BFAME Council Meeting

Minutes of the Second Meeting of the BFAME Council and NBO Representatives The second meeting of the BFAME Council and representatives of the National Bridge Organizations (NBOs) was held at the Media Rotana Hotel.

The Treasurer presented the complete and up-to-date financial accounts of BFAME. A comprehensive five-page document detailing the financial information was distributed to all participants.

Mr. Bahjat Al Majali, President of BFAME, reviewed and explained the financial report. The accounts were unanimously approved.

Awarding of the 24th BFAME Championship Mr. Abdul Hakim Sahab, representative of NBO Saudi Arabia, proposed hosting the next BFAME Championship in Saudi Arabia. India volunteered to serve as the backup host, should Saudi Arabia be unable to meet the hosting requirements. Saudi Arabia was awarded the next BFAME Championship to be held in April / May 2027.

Mr. Abdul Hakim Sahab was requested to finalize the venue within three to six months, after which the final decision will be confirmed by the BFAME President.

The President and all Council members extended their congratulations to the host country, the UAE, for organizing a successful and well-managed Championship. In response, Mr. Ahmed Al Midfa, Head of the UAE Bridge Committee, expressed his gratitude for the strong attendance and thanked everyone for their participation. With no further points on the agenda, the meeting concluded with a vote of thanks to the President.





On the next deal E/W held ♠J76 ♥AK654 ♦7 ♣6432 facing ♠AKQ83 ♥Q ♦K863 ♣AQ8.

North opened 3♦ with ♠5 ♥973 ♦AQJ1092 ♣K97 and East bid 3NT. After diamond lead for the ten and king it is clear that declarer has 10 top tricks but after winning with the ♦K, unblocking the ♥Q and crossing to dummy with the ♠J declarer played three rounds of hearts (perhaps he thought it was safe?) and went two down to give **India** 11 IMPs.

When South refused to ruff in with the ◆J at any point, declarer, having pitched a spade from dummy could cash the ♠A, ruff a spade, ruff a heart and play a spade, scoring the ◆9 en passant for +550.

As long as South ruffs a club at some point there will only be ten tricks.


East started with three rounds of clubs, West ruffing and switching to the ◆7. East won and a fourth club was ruffed in turn by the ♥8, ♥J and ♥K. Declarer cashed the ♥A and then played a spade. East went up with the ♠A (ducking is best) and exited with a spade. Declarer won with dummy's ♠J and came to hand with a diamond. Drawing trumps leaves declarer with the rest, but playing a spade allowed West to ruff for one down, -100 but still 10 IMPs for UAE.

East led the ◆J and continued with the ◆10, declarer ruffing, playing a club to the king and cashing the ♠A. Now the best move is to abandon trumps and play a second club. When declarer cashed the ♠Q he could not avoid three down, -500.

I noticed an interesting possibility.

Suppose East were to lead the ♣A.

Declarer can unblock dummy's \clubsuit K (!) ruff the second round of whichever red suit is attacked, go to dummy with a spade, play a club to the ten and then continue with winning clubs. Wouldn't that be something!



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
The Middlegame
