

Declarer took the opening spade lead in hand and cashed the ace and queen of trumps discovering the 4-1 break. A club to the queen held the trick and declarer then successfully finessed against the jack of clubs and East took the trick with the ace. The return of the ten of diamonds was covered by the jack and taken with West's queen and when a diamonds was returned declarer had the rest of the tricks for 650.



South with a minimum just bid the game. Declarer took the opening spade lead in dummy and cashed

the ace and queen of trumps and returned to hand with a spade and lead a club towards dummy and elected to play the king which lost to the ace. East exited with a trump and declarer cashed the queen of clubs and exited with a club to West's jack, the subsequent diamond lead left declarer with no resource. To succeed declarer basically has to correctly guess the club suit and I can find no obvious reason why one should divine correctly the situation. The upshot was 13 IMPs to India.

The old adage that an opening hand opposite an opening hand is values for game proved to be false on this occasion. The fourth-best lead of the $\clubsuit 4$ saw the queen headed by the king. Declarer ducked the opening two rounds of clubs and then staked all on the diamond position by taking three rounds of spades before proffering the queen of diamonds which, as we can see lost to the king and now the defence had a club, three hearts and a spade to cash for four down -400 in the out column.





On the lead of a diamond, declarer won and eliminated the suit before taking three rounds of trumps finishing in hand. A spade to the jack lost to North's queen and the club return was taken in dummy and now on the play of the king of spades South was endplayed as it was question of either a ruff and discard or leading into the club tenace. 


My fellow editor Mark Horton has an entry in the book of Bols Tips of 'Don't be afraid to respond' (it is actually the first one in the book). East's boldness here paid handsome dividends as somehow it silenced the opposition. Declarer managed two tricks and so was five tricks short of his contract but at 50 points a go it appeared cheap.

East tried to muddy the waters but the opposition made it to the game contract. The lead of the queen of spades was taken in dummy and it was followed by a losing diamond finesse. West continued with the spade attack which declarer allowed to run to East', jack. East exited with jack of clubs and declarer let it pass to West's king. The diamond exit was taken in hand with the ♦9 and the ♥10 held the next trick but West took the heart continuation with the ace and played back a club. Now with the hearts not breaking 3-3 declarer was down. The contract can be made in a number of ways, not always apparent, but there are some interesting endplays if you study all the possibilities. On the actual initial line took to succeed when the spade suit is continued she needed to rise with the king – I will leave it to the reader to work out the winning line of thereafter

but basically someone will be thrown in to either lead into a major suit tenace. So a loss of 8 IMPs.

East did well to go to game. Dummy perforce took the opening queen of hearts with the ace. Trumps were tackled and North took the first round with the ace and switched to a club. Declarer took that trick with the ace and drew trumps finishing in dummy and now took a losing diamond finesse but that guaranteed the contract as the queen of clubs was now protected. Declarer had brought home his contract safely.







Declarer won in dummy, took the marked spade finesse and cashed all the hearts before exiting with a diamond and sitting back and awaiting a lead into his club tenace for his contract. 
I know what you are thinking – he is going to say a slam is available, and you are right but I bet you cannot immediately tell me which slam is makeable and even less how to make it. It is Six Clubs and to make it you have to draw precisely two rounds of trumps and then discard a diamond in dummy on the third round of hearts, take the diamond finesse in the correct direction and then ruff the fourth of diamonds in dummy.




Bangladesh vs. Pakistan - Open
