The Mixed match between India and Pakistan was thrilling in that at the start of the difference was only 22 IMPs, during the session the lead dropped to single figures and there were chances for both teams to gain the iniative but India held on.

























Minutes of the Meeting With WBF Vice President Mr. Eric Laurant

23rd BFAME Championship

Date: 17th April,2025

Venue: Media Rotan Hotel, Dubai

Special Guest: Mr. Eric Laurant, Vice President, World Bridge Federation (WBF)

1. Welcome Address

Mr. Bahjat Al Majali opened the meeting with a warm welcome to Mr. Eric Laurant, WBF Vice President, on the occasion of the 23rd BFAME Championship. He introduced Mr. Laurant to the attendees and provided a brief overview of the championship. Mr. Laurant was then invited to address the gathering.

2. Address by Mr. Eric Laurant (WBF Vice President)

Mr. Laurant highlighted the WBF's firm zero-tolerance policy on cheating in bridge. Key points from his address included:

The WBF is committed to permanently banning individuals found guilty of cheating. Advanced surveillance systems, including camera, light, and audio equipment, have been implemented at WBF-supervised tournaments.

All online games conducted via RealBridge, BBO, and other platforms are monitored in real-time by WBF teams.

Any suspicious or abnormal performance triggers a review, and the concerned National Bridge Organization (NBO) is notified for further action.

Strict punitive measures are taken against any players found in violation.

3. Discussion with NBO Representatives

Each NBO representative was given an opportunity to share updates and challenges related to bridge in their respective regions. A recurring concern among the NBOs was the difficulty in recruiting and retaining new bridge players.

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4. Proposal from WBF to Support Development

In response to the concerns raised, Mr. Laurant proposed the following support from the WBF:

The WBF will send experts to conduct a two-day training seminar aimed at developing bridge talent and promoting the game.

The location of the seminar will be decided by the BFAME Council.

Each NBO may nominate 2 – 3 participants to attend.

WBF will bear all expenses related to the experts.

BFAME will provide accommodation and meals for the visiting experts.

5. Conclusion

The meeting concluded with appreciation for Mr. Laurant's participation and the WBF's continued support. BFAME will coordinate with its member NBOs and the WBF to finalise arrangements for the upcoming seminar.

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


India vs. Jordan - Women


East led the ace of clubs and switched to a spade taken in hand, a small trump led towards dummy and West took the king and played back a club. A trump from dummy saw West duck and dummy then ruffed a club, and exited with a trump. West got off lead with a club which was ruffed in dummy. Declarer now played the king of diamonds and West was in a bind, if he rose with the ace then his enforced diamond return would give declarer access to the established club trick and if he ducked another diamond would be led towards the queen, either way the contract was made plus one.

The lead of the ♠2 went to the ♠9 and king, declarer now played a small heart and ducked when North played the ♥8. Another spade from North saw declarer take a losing finesse and he allowed a small club from South to run to North's queen, and North exited with a club to dummy's jack. Declarer compounded her misery by cashing the ace of spades and leading a small diamond to her jack and North's queen. In theory the defence had the rest of the tricks but the defence gave up a trick when South at trick twelve had to lead from ♠A10 but still three off vulnerable.

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



South started with an unfortunate king of clubs before switching to a spade won in hand. Declarer should be easily home now but she unaccountably played a club from hand and played the ♣7 from dummy, for this to be right she must believe that South started with four clubs to the AK, if so she can find out this information by playing the queen from hand. If North shows out then you can finesse against the ♣10 later on. The only time this might lose is if South led a singleton king (likely? I think not) but even so you have set up a club trick. When North played back the queen of spades, declarer won and played a heart towards the king, losing to the ace and another spade came back. Now you can see why it was important to play the queen of clubs earlier on. If North does have the outstanding club honour you will now go down. However all was well as S outh was in possession of it and had no spade to play so contract made, albeit shakily and 13 IMPOs to India.

India had taken the session comfortably 60 - 22 giving them a big lead of 75.

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


Pakistan vs. Bangladesh - Seniors

he fourth session of the semi-final in the Mixed Championship sees us watching Pakistan vs. Bangladesh. Currently Bangladesh have a lead just under 30 points – certainly easily erased over 48 boards.


East led a small diamond which North won with his ace and played a small spade to the queen and West's ace. Another diamond followed which East took and played another spade, won in dummy. The ♣10 was run to East's queen and another spade forced declarer to ruff. The ▼10 went to dummy's queen and declarer misquessed the clubs by playing one to the ace which East ruffed and he got off lead with a trump and there was still the king of clubs and a trump trick to come taking the contract two down. It is theoretically possible to make the contract but you need divine inspiration by cashing the club ace at trick two and continuing the suit.

A small diamond towards dummy saw the king win and the last club ruffed. Another diamond endplayed South in to taking his ace and leading a heart into declarer's tenace. A remarkable plus two. Brother Hubert would have beaten the contract as he always leads a trump.



South's king of diamonds was taken by dummy's ace and when declarer led the queen of trumps and surprisingly decided to play the ace, the king of hearts was taken by South's ace and a diamond cashed. A third round of diamonds saw North discard a heart. Declarer ruffed a heart and played a club but North rose with an honour and cashed the king of trumps and played a third leaving declarer with a losing heart and so three off. 9 IMPs to Bangladesh.

At the end of the session Bangladesh had won it 47 - 29 thus their lead was now nearly 50 points. Pakistan would have to come fighting hard in the last two sessions.

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


India vs. Pakistan - Mixed

he penultimate round of the semi-final in the Mixed Championship saw India face Pakistan. The match was close with India just 30 IMPs ahead, certainly achievable over 32 boards.


On the lead of a heart South won and switched to a trump which declarer ducked to North's queen. Another trump followed and declarer then drew the outstanding trump and now had to consider how to play the club suit. Should he take the finesse of cash the ace and king and ruff one. A priori which do think is the better odds? The answer is not to take the finesse which is just a shade short of 52%, but I stress this a priori. Here there are other indications, some pro, some contra. You could argue that as a result of the bidding North is more likely to hold the queen or that South is likely to have more clubs because North has fewer vacant places. As it happens it does not matter which view you take – they are both right, so the contract makes.

I am sure we did not need to be alerted that the 2♦ bid was weak.the ♦J lost to declarer and the king of clubs won the next trick before a losing club finesse was taken. Another diamond was played and South produced the queen and taken by declarer who then cashed four rounds of clubs and North opted to keep ♠Kx and so discarded two diamonds which meant declarer could now set up a heart trick and make his contract.

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



North cashed his ace of spades and now needed to find a way to get South on lead and play a diamond back. A club seems a good choice as there is always the chance that South has the ace so he leads the ♣3 but declarer lets it run round to his ace and then plays a heart which South perforce wins. What is South to do now? Obviously a spade is pointless and he has no heart. The question is could North hold a singleton club or a void in diamonds? The problem if he has either he would lead a club! We know he does not have a singleton diamond or he would have led it so he 0,2 or 3, whereas in clubs he can have 1,2,3 or 4 which is more possibilities than diamonds. I do not know whether that has any logic to it but South came up with the right answer and returned a diamond for North to ruff. Declarer was truly unlucky the hearts had to be small doubleton on his left and the defence had to be perfect-you won't find that very often


There is no BBO record for this hand but the story goes that the auction was the same and North played two rounds of spades, the second being ruffed before a trump was played won by South who returned a diamond but North played the ♣4. There is some discussion as to whether this card fell from his hand or whether, perhaps through tiredness, played the wrong card. As the director was not called the result stands and so 13 IMPs to India.
