Those who suffer regularly from this Intro will know I like to include a graph or two, giving a longer-term perspective on current events. I tried to do that this time, but the thing stubbornly refused to be shoehorned into a small enough space. So, it's now a <u>separate article</u>, which you can find immediately after June's.

Suffice it to say here that June took charge of our junior bridge efforts in 2020. The first Cup after that attracted 84 pupils; this year, we had 138, with a further 20 at a separate event on an earlier day. June is standing down at our next AGM and I would like to pay tribute to her efforts over the last five years. Derek Thrumble has volunteered to take over, and I send him all my best wishes for future success.

Finally, don't forget our Mary Edwards (pairs) and Wanborough (teams) Cup competitions.

They'll be held at Wimbledon BC on May 11th and June 1st respectively. These are 36-board events which begin at 1pm and finish by 5.30.

They are the chance for the winning players in each club's pairs and teams events to represent that club. If your winners can't take part on the

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date, then you can go down the ranking list to find another pair. In the case of teams, a pair within a team can be substituted.

If you don't run a teams championship at your club, you can use a cross-IMPed pairs event to form a team.

It would be great to see every club in the county represented.

Voice from the Deep

Perhaps what follows is not strictly in keeping with the usual content of this column. I might have done better to direct my comments to the Competitions Secretary, to the Resident Statistician or to whichever member of the committee has cabinet responsibility for anomalies, eccentricities and general oddities.

It goes like this :-

On 2 December last, a Monday, we played the evening session at our club - as usual

We came bottom - as usual

We scored 35% - more or less as usual

It happened to be an evening of simultaneous competition and later, or the next morning, I checked, out of mild curiosity, to see how we had fared on the wider stage.

To my astonishment I found that Surrey-wide we were 30somethingth out of 170 or so with 55%! More astonishing still, we were the leading pair from our club!

Must be a rare distinction to be both top and bottom in the same session.

But Andy Warhol was right - you only get 15 minutes of fame, for a little later another club contributed its results and we were relegated to only second-best from our club.

Worse, later still the results had expunged our club's results altogether so this that short-lived exploit was doomed to everlasting extinction. (Subsequently I discovered the causes of these curiosities but I don't reveal them here, partly to protect the guilty and the innocent, but mostly to avoid anti-climax).

Speaking of eccentricities and anomalies I recall a more conventional example (thinks : there must be a contradiction in there somewhere). We were playing at our club in France, bid comfortably to 3NT, went one down and were suitably miffed.

But not for long. There were about 11 or 12 tables and at every single one of them 3NT had been bid and had gone off. 50% all round.

Explanation : the partnership held two flat hands with no fit and 28 points consisting of 4 aces and 4 kings.

8 certain tricks; 5 certain losers.

Hey ho! Or in the context "C'est la vie !"

Surrey Schools Cup

June Middleton

The Surrey Schools' Cup competitions were held on 7th February 2025, brilliantly hosted by Epsom College. 138 children took part on the day and a further 20 minibridge players played the same hands in an event hosted by Tormead School a couple of weeks earlier. There were 25 teams in the three main competitions and 19 pairs in the minibridge at Epsom, packing the two rooms used to the rafters. A pair of adults stepped in to make up tables in the minibridge but were disqualified from winning!

We welcomed Heathside School, Walton on Thames, and Lancing Prep for the first time.

The Surrey Schools' Cup had eight teams and was won by the North London Alliance team made up of Angus and Wilf Marshall from Watford Grammar School, Dina Bennett from Henrietta Barnett School and Sam Akayan from Haberdashers. Dina has recently set up a thriving bridge club at her school and hopefully will be able to bring a team from her school next year. Close second, trailing by 5 IMPs, were the King's College School from Wimbledon, Maks Blicharz, Raffy & Seb Sinclair and Joseph Hedges.

Our second-tier tournament for the Salver had seven teams taking part, and was won by the Cardinal Newman A team of Tom Curtayne, Joshua Bundingan, Jake Piddlesdon & Michael Simpson. They had a large lead over the Westminster B team and the Haberdashers C team who tied for 2nd, 45 IMPs behind. Unfortunately, we only had one set of medals for the presentation ceremony but will get another set ordered so everyone can have one!

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Our third-tier tournament for the Crystal, aimed at those who have only recently started bidding, had ten teams taking part and was won by the Westminster C team of Bruno Zheng, Jatanara Ansari, Mark Tabet and Max Xue with a 15 IMPS lead from Richard Challoner's 1st team of Szymon Kowaliw, Sam Wylie, Mircea Nagy & Kay Rusinsky.

The minibridge competition for the David Garfit Clowes Trophy was won by Arthur and Zac from Boxgrove Primary, Edward Shevyrev & Joseph Ling from Westminster were second and Agnes & Felicity from Tormead were third.

My thanks to Tracy and Fran from Epsom College for all their help in making this event happen, to Derek Thrumble who will be taking over for next year's event, David Woodall and Helen Bickerstaff for running the minibridge at Epsom and Douglas Wright for running the minibridge at Tormead, Tim Warren, the Surrey Chair for his assistance on the day and presenting the prizes, Rachel Sumeray and Joan Bennett for all their assistance on the day. The biggest thank you goes to Richard Banbury for running three teams' events simultaneously with the minibidge competition and having to manually produce the minibridge results combining the two tournaments.

Our Schools Cup – A Longer-Term Perspective

Following on from June Middleton's report just above, I'd like to take a longer-term look at our Surrey Schools Cup.


Here's how attendance has evolved in the last ten years:

Covid, which hit just as June took on our junior bridge efforts, had a dramatic effect on schools' bridge; some school clubs closed altogether, and haven't reopened. But look at the surge in overall numbers since then.

So, what's behind the increase?

While the sterling efforts of key people around the county have led to new bridge clubs at some schools, that doesn't appear to be the main cause. We opened the Cup to those outside the county in 2018, but since then the total number of schools coming along has been roughly steady, with Surrey schools making up about two-thirds:



I asked several teachers at our event what they thought the reason was. Everyone I spoke to had a definite sense that bridge was proving more popular among their kids. One even said "in some ways bridge is more cool, or at least less uncool, than it used to be". Who'd have thought that?

The charity arm of English bridge, EBED, has a specific aim of fostering bridge among those in full-time education. It's recently appointed a new Chief Executive, Richard Croot, and in January we were very pleased to welcome him to tell the chairs of Surrey BCs about EBED's future direction (see the next article). Surrey has been actively committed to supporting the national direction for many years now, and we look forward to working together.

English Bridge Development and Education

Richard gave a good talk at the Surrey Chairs' Consultation, with some interesting ideas for youngsters to play online – see Thursday Afternoon Bridge Club and The Generation Game below. Here are some key points of his talk.


There are four EBU events in which you can represent Surrey. For two of these, the Pachabo Cup and the Corwen Trophy, selection is automatic based on your team winning the Lady Rose Cup (Pachabo) or your pair finishing in the top five of the County Pairs (Corwen). If the winning team of the Lady Rose is not available the runners up will be asked and similarly pairs outside the top five of the County Pairs will be invited should any of the automatically qualified pairs be unavailable.

For the other two events the Tollemache, which is played between all the counties of England and Wales, and the Metropolitan Cup, played between the Home Counties, selection is made by a committee of three or four experienced Surrey players. For the Tollemache players selected will normally be experienced Tournament players and the committee will consider pairs performance in EBU national events as well as the premier Surrey events and recent performance in the Tollemache if they have been selected in recent years.

The Metropolitan Cup is a one-day online event, usually now held in the autumn. It offers players of a range of experience the chance to represent the county, as it's played in three divisions: the A division is broadly aimed at NGS Ace, the B division at NGS K and Q, and the C division NGS J and Ten. The selectors encourage experienced club players to put their names forward, preferably as pairs, for consideration. The Metropolitan Cup is a great way to test your skills against players from other counties, even if you normally only play at your local club. And you have the chance to go on to the national final should you win your division.




We would also like to identify any school / college teacher, who would like to be involved.

Double Dummy Puzzle #25

A diversion this time into the realms of Double Dummy problems that involve distributions one never normally expects to come across – the type of hand you only expect to see in bridge stories. Imagine you were East on the hand shown. Your eyes bulge at the prospects of an easy Slam, possibly even a Grand Slam in one of the minors, but your opponents' irritating interventions spoil all your fun with the temerity of bidding their own Grand Slam against you. Which, on a combined total of only 18 points, is a positive insult. Certainly, one worthy of a massively satisfying punishment.




The bidding, for those who like to see how NS actually got there, was

This hand actually happened many years ago. I'd rate it as tricky. It would have been a simple cross ruff without the 2-0 trump split, but then it wouldn't be worth offering as a DD puzzle. But make it declarer did. All you have to do is tell me how (johnmanches74@gmail.com). By April 20th please.

South to make $7 \bullet$. Lead $\bullet 9$

SOLUTION

The puzzle might look simple at first sight. 6 diamond tricks, 4 spade tricks (ruffing one to establish the suit), 2 outside aces and the two queens poised for a club heart-squeeze on West.

Only it doesn't quite work out that way, as West is discarding after South when you run North's trumps. After a while (or perhaps immediately for some) you stop being blinded by South's QC and realise it is North's 8C that is the threat card when you run South's Spades.

- T1 Win with J
- T2 AD
- T₃₋₅ KS, AS and a spade ruff establish South's Spades.
- T6-8 Run North's trumps, discarding Q10 of Clubs on the the last two trumps
- T9 AC
- T10-11 Two spade tricks force West either to discard his last club (when North's 8C provides the 13th trick) or to uncover his KH (when AH drops the K giving QH for T13).
